Being part of shaping this next chapter of the Coliseum has been one of the great privileges of my life. It has asked all of us – artists, staff, audiences, communities – to work in new ways, be braver, and to imagine beyond the familiar. And for me, this is also deeply personal.

Growing up working class in Oldham, in a family that didn't speak the language of arts or higher education, I know what it means to walk into rooms you're not sure were built for you. The accents, the unspoken codes, the quiet shrinking of yourself just to fit in - it lingers. Yet those of us who grew up on the edges often carry powerful instincts for community, humour, graft and storytelling. I want those instincts at the heart of the Coliseum we're rebuilding.

That's why A Christmas Fair feels so important. It embodies everything we are: gritty, northern, warm, and rooted in real people and real places. It champions local talent, from the performers discovered through our open auditions, and it opens the door wide for our Young Company; giving Oldham's young people a platform to learn, stretch, and shine.

At the helm is Jimmy, whose star brings freshness, an emotional truth, and a sense of play that feels unmistakably of this place. He holds the community at the centre of his vision. Even the market at the heart of the show reflects Oldham's spirit - makers, crafters, small businesses, people grafting with pride. Audiences can enjoy a brilliant night at the theatre and pick up their Christmas presents from local creatives. It's theatre woven into everyday life.

This Spring and Summer, as we gather in rooms big and small, in studios and outdoor spaces across the town, we're not just programming a season. We're rehearsing for the future Coliseum - the one that will return to Fairbottom Street carrying the stories, skills, humour and heart of a borough that refuses to be underestimated.

It takes a village, they say. I was raised by one. And now I get to build one.

ABOUT NOT TOO TAME



Not Too Tame are award-winning, 'great night out' specialists producing high-octane, heart-on-sleeve stories steeped in working-class culture and made by working-class artists. For more than a decade, Not Too Tame has been quietly, and sometimes raucously, rewriting the rules of popular theatre. Over its 11 years of critical and audience acclaim, the company has developed a signature style that is equal parts raw energy, finely tuned craft and a refusal to put barriers between stage and stalls. Much of that ethos can be traced to artistic director Jimmy Fairhurst, whose initial three years with Cheek By Jowl brought a nuanced understanding of space, a rigorous physicality and an ensemble discipline to his work. Add to that the influence of directors like Mike Leigh and Matthew Dunster, and the creative friendships he has fostered with figures such as Trevor Griffiths, and you find a methodology steeped in precision yet bristling with vitality. It is this fusion, exacting artistry rooted in lived experience, that has kept Not Too Tame both relevant and beloved, a company that manages to be populist without ever feeling compromised.
